Hams Helping People That's What It's All About

When it comes to helping people, we Hams know how to step up to the plate and do what we are trained to do (at least we should). Here is one example of a Ham helping another person. In this case, another Ham many miles away. On March 22nd, a group of Hams went on a camping trip to Parker Canyon Lake in southern Arizona. One of these Hams, was Stan – WE7DOG. Stan was pulling a travel trailer and was about 15 miles south of the town of Sonoita Az. We Hams (N7JND, N7EMB, WE7DOG, AC7DS and N3QVK) were in a convoy on the way to the lake when it was noticed by Dave – AC7DS & Brenda – N3QVK, that something was hanging very low to the ground on the travel trailer of WE7DOG. After Stan pulled over, it was at that time he found that the ball receptor of his hitch that attaches to the A-Frame of his travel trailer had split. He was lucky that the whole hitch did not break off, especially while driving! Stan was at a dead stop and was unable to continue.

We decided to go ahead and secure our campsites for three trailers as we didn't know how busy the lake would be. It was when Stan came up on EAARS and contacted Fred – WW6F and without hesitation, Fred proceeded to locate and contact a welder in the Sonoita area to come out and make repairs to the hitch. Now, keep in mind, 15 miles south of Sonoita to Parker Canyon Lake, there is NO cell phone coverage! But there is Ham Radio coverage. After we arrived to our campsite, we took about an hour unloading our camping supplies and setting up our own trailer. I left N7EMB to finish setting up while I headed back out to meet Stan where we left him stranded along the side of the road. About 4 miles down the road, Stan passes me in his truck pulling his trailer! Not only did WW6F save the day by hopping on the phone and contacting a welder in the area, the welder showed up within an hour and made the repairs and sent Stan was on his way! Wow!

When you are dead in the water sitting on the side of the road with no cell phone coverage, but your 2 meter radio works just fine and people like Fred – WW6F are listening, problems get solved rather quickly! I like to think that any of us would have answered the call for assistance! Fred saved the day and although he will say that he's just doing what any Ham Radio Operator would do, he was certainly, the hero of the day! By the way, we had an awesome camping trip!

NEW RULES - MORE ROOKIES!

- You can be a Rookie if you were first licensed in 2017, 2016 or 2015 send the year you were first licensed in the exchange.
- Starting in April, if you were licensed before 2015 you can also be a Rookie if you made your first Amateur Radio contact during 2017, 2016 or 2015 or if you haven't made any contacts on the contest mode (SSB, CW, or RTTY) before the Rookie Roundup contest, send the current year (2017) in your exchange - either of these reasons qualify you as a Rookie for just one year.
- Rookies will attempt to make as many contacts as possible during this 6-hour event.
 Rookies work everyone and non-Rookies work only Rookies.

Mission & Objective-

Mission: To encourage newly-licensed operators ("Rookies") in North America (including territories and possessions) to operate on the HF bands and experience competitive Amateur Radio operating. Experienced operators ("Non-Rookies") are strongly encouraged to participate and help new operators – either on the air or in person.

Objective: Rookies exchange information with as many other stations as possible on the 80, 40, 20, 15, and 10 meter HF bands. Rookie entrants are encouraged to read "HF Contesting – Good Practices, Interpretations and Suggestions."

How is A Rookie Defined?-


In the Rookie Roundup, a Rookie is defined has having been first licensed in the current calendar year or the previous two calendar years, regardless of license class.

I'm a non-Rookie; how can I help a Rookie?-

The easiest thing you can do to help a Rookie is to get on the air and work Rookies. However, helping your club get Rookies on the air is also very helpful. Your non-Rookie club members can open their shacks and allow a Rookie to operate, provide in-the-shack coaching to a Rookie, or act as control operator to allow a Technician class licensee to operate in the General or Extra portion of the band (depending on your own license class). Information on being a control operator is found in FCC Part 97.105.

If you act as control operator for a Rookie, be sure to observe the **Third-Party Traffic regulations**; It is not legal for unlicensed (or under-licensed) third parties to communicate on the air with amateurs or with other unlicensed third parties at amateur stations without a third-party traffic agreement in place. In general, most European countries do not have third-party traffic agreements with the US, but many South American and some African and Caribbean nations do. Cooking up Some MagiC





In this healthy broccoli-Cheddar-chicken chowder recipe, heavy cream is replaced with milk and flour-thickened chicken broth and we keep sodium amounts reasonable with lower-sodium broth. By making your own homemade creamy broccoli, Cheddar and chicken chowder, you'll save up to 300 calories, 20 grams of saturated fat and 500 milligrams of sodium per serving compared to many store-bought or restaurant chowders.

Ingredients

3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

1 cup diced onion

1 cup diced celery

1/2 cup all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon dry mustard

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon ground pepper

4 cups reduced-sodium chicken broth

1 cup whole milk

3 cups chopped broccoli florets

2 cups diced Yukon Gold potatoes

1 pound boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut into bite-size pieces

1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese, plus more for garnish

Finely diced red onion for garnish

Steps

Heat oil in a large pot over medium heat. Add onion and celery; cook, stirring frequently, until softened and beginning to brown, 3 to 6 minutes. Sprinkle flour, dry mustard, salt and pepper over the vegetables and cook, stirring, for 1 minute more. Add broth and milk; bring to a gentle boil, stirring constantly.

Stir in broccoli and potatoes and bring just to a simmer. Simmer, uncovered, stirring occasionally, until the potatoes are tender, 12 to 15 minutes.

Add chicken and 1 cup Cheddar and cook, stirring frequently, until cooked through, 4 to 6 minutes. Serve topped with a little more Cheddar and red onion, if desired. Serves 6.

To Make Ahead

Cover and refrigerate for up to 3 days, slowly reheat over medium-low or microwave on Medium power.
