Lets Move the Summer Hamfest back to FT Tuthill or at least Flagstaff

Talk to any of the old hams and the Ft Tuthill hamfest was the greatest. And then it got moved to Williams and nobody went. Williams was dusty not like Tuthill and it was 30 miles farther. Still up in the cool country in July but, 30 miles farther, nothing to do in Williams and, it was 30 miles farther so, nobody went.

Well not exactly but, not as many went and it got better but, it was 30 miles farther.

I attended Williams 2015 and it was nice, Superfest 2015 in Mesa was bigger but, Williams was ok, there were some interesting seminars, and the annual ARCA meeting was there if you want to know what ARCA is doing for the ham community you should have somebody attend. Would I stay in Williams again? NO, we paid almost \$300 at Howard Johnson Motel for 3 people for 2 nights and then when I arrived, they wanted an additional service charge. Outside of the ARCA board, nobody likes Williams, I understand there was even a petition at Superfest to move back to Ft Tuthill. When it was brought up at the ARCA meeting, I brought up all the negative comments I keep hearing on the repeaters and I got answers.

Tuthill would cost twice as much (ARCA has been tracking it) and, I think ARCA actually lost money on Williams this year so, the losses would be much bigger.

The local clubs show no interest in doing a hamfest in Flagstaff (or Williams) so the ARCA volunteers get to do all the work.

It would take several years for a Hamfest in the Flagstaff area to grow to what Ft Tuthill used to be IF IT EVER DID.

I think it was mentioned in years past that Flagstaff burned ARCA by double booking Ft Tuthill at the last minute but, I could be wrong on that.

So, here are your options,

1)Become a ARCA officer (they are always looking for help) tell them you want a Flagstaff hamfest and YOU will do the full years worth of work to make it happen.

2)Get some of your buddies together and do it all on your own, ARCA will coordinate it, just not on the Williams weekend.

3)Stop complaining and enjoy the 2 cool country hamfests we have, Show low the first Saturday in

June and Williams the 4th weekend in July.

What is ARCA?

The Amateur Radio Council of Arizona, Inc. (ARCA) is a statewide organization comprised of Amateur Radio Clubs from all parts of Arizona, working for the betterment of Amateur Radio statewide. ARCA affiliated clubs present a unified front and have a means to exchange ideas and activities in the spirit of fraternity for which Amateur Radio is so famous. The objectives of the Council are to combine opinions, ideas, and strengths of the various clubs; to assist the affiliated clubs in promoting the welfare of the Amateur Radio fraternity; and to encourage activities that will benefit the art of Amateur Radio. Each affiliated club is represented by a delegate or alternate at each of the Council meetings (currently 4 per year). These delegates nominate and elect the officers of the Council and exchange suggestions on ARCA activities. Implementation begins after a majority vote of the representatives present.

The officers of ARCA invite all Arizona Amateur Radio Clubs to consider becoming a member. One club (even two or three) might not have the resources to undertake some of the projects which are important to them, but working together gets the job done. What better reason for your club participating? We know that ARCA needs you, and hope that you will feel you need to be a part of ARCA.

Amateur Radio Council of Arizona activities include:

The annual ARCA / Williams Hamfest in Williams, AZ. ARCA also sponsors a number of hamfests and conventions held across Arizona throughout the year. A master Hamfest Calendar is maintained to help avoid scheduling conflicts and help advertise Amateur Radio events.

Scholarships. ARCA awards scholarships to licensed amateurs who are enrolled in an institute of higher learning. Candidates are nominated by and are members of affiliated clubs.

<u>Grants</u>. Grants are given to affiliated clubs for purposes that benefit the Amateur Radio community and enhance the communications network in the state.

Frequency Coordinating Committee. Composed of repeater owners, this group voluntarily works out problems on frequency allocation, coverage, etc., publishes a semi-annual directory of repeaters in the state and provides this information to the ARRL Repeater Directory.

Ham of the Year Award (HOY). A handsome plaque is awarded to the person chosen based on outstanding service to the Ham community. Nominations are made by affiliated clubs and voting is done by previous HOY recipients.

Young Ham of the Year Award (YHOY). One deserving young individual under the age of 18 years is honored as the ARCA Young Ham of the Year. Nominations are made by affiliated clubs. Voting is done by previous HOY recipients.

<u>Causes for the general benefit of Amateur Radio</u>. ARCA is ARRL affiliated and supports their work for the benefit of Amateur Radio and the protection of Amateur's rights and frequencies. ARCA is also active in state and local issues affecting Amateur Radio, such as tower ordinances, auto license plates, etc.

Public Relations is one of ARCA's most important functions.
