73 . . . Joe Chief operator - K3TYE Trustee - WN7BSA One of my greatest passions is helping our community, as many hams do. I liked reading this email and asked KA7TUR if I could share with you...

Angie, I do so appreciate the time and effort that you put into the newsletter. The only reason I became interested in Amateur Radio was because of Public Service. I have had the crowning experience for a public service HAM. Early one evening in October of 1989, I received a frantic phone call from a lady in the town of Umatilla Oregon. At that time I was living in Hermiston, Oregon a few miles away. How she found out I was a HAM, I have no idea. She could hardly express herself. All of her children were in Santa Rosa California, and the Loma Prieta earthquake had happened just minutes earlier. (Of course there was no telephone communications. Microwave radio stations lose their alignment when the earth moves, copper cables loose their continuity when the earth moves, and fiber optic cables sever when the earth moves.) I calmed her down as much as possible and got their local phone number and address, and told her I would do my best to find her children.

Here is the way it went: I came up on the Oregon ARES frequency which already had a net control operator on the air. He called for new stations, and I gave my call. He told me to state my traffic. I asked him what frequency the Santa Rosa ARES net was on. He answered me, and I checked out of his net. I went to the Santa Rosa Frequency, and there was an active net in progress. Traffic being passed as fast as the net control operator could control. A few minutes went by and he asked for any new stations. Again I sent my Call. He asked me what traffic I had, and I answered one Health and Welfare for Santa Rosa. He told me to stand by on frequency. Several anxious moments passed before I was called by Net Control. he told me to move down 10 KhZ and contact another ham in Santa Rosa. I did so and the other Ham was waiting for me. I do not remember his call, but I will always be grateful to him. He took the local phone and address, and told me to go back to net frequency, and I did so. Several more anxious moments, and Net Control called me and sent me back down 10 KHz, to receive traffic. I did so and there was my contact reporting to me that everyone was safe and well.

The most exciting moment I have ever had relative to Amateur Radio was the phone call I was able to make to tell the mother of those children that her kids were all safe and sound.

Ham Radio Operators Helping The Community by Chris N7JND

When it comes to helping the public, we Hams like to step up to the plate. On Sunday April 29th, the March for Babies once again, asked Angie – N7EMB to provide Communications for this great event. This is one of the main reasons she got into the Ham Radio hobby. Because she wanted to help the public in a unique way. Her wishes came true when she found out that Ham Radio was more than just reading a resistor color code chart.

Back in 2004, she assembled a group of Hams to provide communications for this event. And her core group is still helping her after all these years. She does many other events also. Many new Hams have stepped up to the plate and became part of her team. If she's not organizing the team, she's helping out other teams. There are many paths to take in this hobby, and this is hers. She loves what she does to help people.

If you have helped out in community events involving Ham Radio, THANK YOU!!! If you have not, you are missing out on a fantastic way to assist the public and play radio at the same time. These events simply place Ham Radio Operators throughout the course and your number one priority, is to place that emergency call for help should someone go down or need assistance. You may also be asked to help with other parts of the event such as Parking, directing traffic, directing people to turn here, ETC...

Some events are small, some are large. Some take 2-3 hours on a weekend morning, some take the whole weekend involving camping out. If you are interested in helping out with these events, I recommend starting out with a smaller event. You will usually be paired up with a seasoned person to show you the ropes which is probably nothing more than reporting any issues and maybe saying... "We Need More Water". Then the larger events are a lot more involved, but still your main assignment will be reporting any emergency issues and probably a lot more air time.

Most events are directed by an Net Control Station (NCS). They are your main contact at the event and the NCS is usually located near the hub of the event. This allows messages and other communications to be directly delivered to the event coordinator. Prior to the event, you will be assigned a primary frequency and possibly a secondary frequency as a back up. You will know your frequencies to program in your radio far ahead of the event date and your assignment and all other information. All you need to do then, is show up to your assigned position and check in with the NCS station. The NCS station will release and secure your position.

If you aren't sure of the path(s) you want to take in this hobby, consider Community Events. They are FUN and you are doing a good deed for the public. After all, it is OUR Community!

ARRL Website, Some Services to be Down Briefly on May 1

The ARRL website and some services will be down for maintenance for up to 1 hour on Tuesday, May 1, starting at approximately 0900 UTC. During this period some or all systems may be temporarily inaccessible. This includes all content on www.arrl.org (including the ARRL Store), http://contest-clubs.arrl.org, and http://contest-log-submission.arrl.org. Logbook of the World and e-mail will not be affected. We apologize for any inconvenience.

Logbook of The World has Online Status Monitor

ARRL-04/26/2018

Logbook of The World (LoTW) now has a full-time status monitor. The system's status is displayed in real time and is available offsite, offering a single spot for all users — web, Facebook, Twitter, etc. — to quickly check what's happening with the online repository of contacts and confirmations.

At a glance, the LoTW status monitor shows if the system is up, paused, or down; overall uptime statistics, and quick stats. A green status means all systems are go, a red status

means the system is down, and a black status means the system has been paused. The monitor indicates overall uptime for the past 24 hours, the past 7 days, and the past 30 days, as well as the most-recent downtime occurrence.



GR9RW will be Royal Wedding Special Event Call Sign

ARRL-04/25/2018

To celebrate the marriage of Great Britain's Prince Harry to American actress Meghan Markle, special event call sign GR9RW will be on the air May 19 – 23. It's believed that this will mark the first use of a GR9 call sign prefix in the UK.

The royal wedding will take place on May 19 at St. George's Chapel in England's Windsor Castle. Members of the Cray Valley Radio




Society (CVRS) will operate GR9RW from their club station in Eltham. GR9RW will primarily use SSB and CW, with the addition of FM on VHF and UHF.

Two HF stations and one VHF station will cover all bands from 80 meters to 70 centimeters. A commemorative QSL card is available upon request.

Frank Victor Tarkington, W3KLQ, SK - Installed First TV in the White House

Frank Tarkington, W3KLQ, of Silver Spring, Maryland, died on April 19. He was 102. A California native and World War II Navy radioman, Tarkington went on to enjoy a long career with Radio Corporation of America (RCA). In 1948, he installed the first television set in the White House so that President Harry Truman could witness the opening of Congress that January. Following his retirement, Tarkington was active for 19 years as a volunteer for Montgomery County Consumer Protection. — Thanks to John Creel, WB3GXW



Cooking up Some MagiC



Chicken Chilaquilas Casserole

Prep time: 5 minutes Total Time: 45 minutes

Servings: 6

Ingredients

- -1/2 cup vegetable oil
- -10 flour tortillas (6 to 8 inches in diameter), cut into 1/2-inch strips
- -2 cups shredded cooked chicken or turkey
- -1 1/3 cups salsa verde or green sauce
- -2 cups shredded mozzarella or cheddar cheese (8 ounces)



Directions

- 1. Heat oil in 10-inch skillet until hot. Cook tortilla strips in oil 30 to 60 seconds or until light golden brown; drain.
- Heat oven to 350°F. Grease 2-quart casserole.
- 3. Layer half of the tortilla strips in casserole; top with chicken, half of the salsa verde (about 2/3 cup) and 1 cup of the cheese. Press layers gently down into casserole. Repeat with remaining tortilla strips, sauce and cheese.
- 4. Bake about 30 minutes or until cheese is melted and golden brown.

This is one N7JND's favorites! I also make this over the stove in a pot.

Either way, it is yummy!
