You must be a member of the EAARS Facebook page to see the listings and to post to the section. This also means you must have a Facebook account. Sorry, can't get around that.

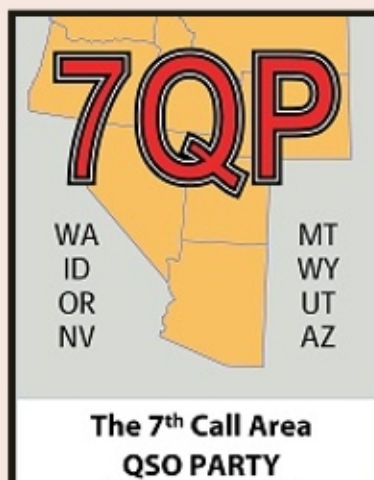
If you would like to see what people have for sale in the EAARS Facebook page FOR SALE section, just watch your notifications (Make sure Notifications are turned on for the EAARS group). If you would like to post to the EAARS Facebook Page For-Sale section, just become a member of the EAARS Facebook page by going to www.facebook.com/groups/EAARS and select JOIN. Once you are a member of the page, simply do the following...

Where you would normally write a post, go to the right where it says MORE and select "Sell Something". Click on this and you will be prompted to input what you are selling, the price, your zip code and a description of your item. You can also add photos to show what you are selling. 7QP - the 7th Call Area QSO Party

7QP is an amateur radio contest, held annually on the first Saturday in May. The stations of the US 7th call area (Arizona, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming) become "the pursued", and the rest of the US, Canada, and the world tries to work as many of us, on as many bands/modes as possible, over an 18-hour period commencing at 6:00am Pacific Time (1300 UTC).

In the 2015 7QP, nearly 1200 stations in the 7th call area participated, and more than 6500 stations from elsewhere, including stations from more than 80 countries.

7QP was originally organized by the Central Oregon DX Club (CODXC), based in Bend, Oregon.

Not Getting On the Air

Some new hams get their license, buy a radio, stuff it into the closet and never get on the air. Big mistake. One reason is that they got into ham radio for use in case of a major calamity. "When the stuff hits the fan, I'll get the radio out." Of course, that will be too late...you'll be sitting there reading the manual trying to figure out how to contact someone. You really need to get familiar with the radio well before a disaster happens.

Another reason new hams don't get on the air is that its overwhelming. Where do I start? Who do I talk to? Good questions. You might start by talking with a local ham you know. Ask them to get on a quiet simplex frequency and just chat with you. I've done this for new folks...its just a safe way to get some air time.

One challenge we have is that many repeaters are pretty darn quiet. It is common to not have anyone listening and not much chatter on a repeater. For example, my UHF repeater sometimes sits there all day long without anyone talking on it. So if you just get on the repeater and say your call sign, you might not get a reply. Don't take it personally.

What can you do? Well, listen a lot. Put your radio on scan and try to find frequencies that have activity. Find out when the local nets are scheduled and listen then. When you feel comfortable, go ahead and check into the net. When you do find a repeater or simplex frequency that seems active, go ahead and make a call. Don't be afraid to say "This is KFOXYZ looking for a signal report. Anyone around?" You are more likely to get a response if you make a specific request.

Listening To Ham Radio with Vintage Police Scanners

These days, many of our police & fire departments along with many other services, have moved to a digital format. What we used to enjoy listening to on our old crystal scanners and early programmable scanners, has become a thing of the past. But have they really become obsolete???

As stated above, many services have gone to a digital format. But that does not mean these older scanners are totally useless and not quite ready for the vintage radio scrap yard. There is still plenty to listen to on these older scanners and they can be found pretty cheaply. I own a few older scanners including the Regency crystal scanner my father bought me when I was 12 years old. I still have it.

Most vintage programmable scanners have the ability to receive Ham Radio on the 2 Meter ham band along with the 70cm ham band. These older scanners can be placed in various parts of the home to monitor your favorite repeaters or simplex frequencies. I personally keep one in the back room, bedroom on the night stand and also here in the Ham Shack to let me keep an ear on various local repeaters while keeping my main radio tuned to EAARS.

These older scanners can be found pretty inexpensive on Ebay. The photo above of the Realistic PRO-2001 was found on Ebay for \$6.00. Yes... \$6 dollars and it works perfect. It sits in my shack as I type this and I use it to monitor local repeaters. Even on the telescoping antenna, it picks up everything I want to listen to. I could hook it to an outside antenna if I needed to. Southern Pacific Railroad is another service I listen to along with the aircraft towers at Tucson International Airport & Ryan Field.

So, if you want a cheap way to monitor many ham frequencies without using your HT or other fixed radio in the shack which you probably want to use that radio to monitor your main favorite repeater, look at some of these vintage scanners. Shop wisely of course to make sure it's fully functional.

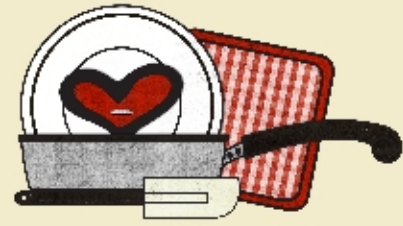
Due to the health and welfare of our amateur ham radio community, all events have been cancelled or postponed for the month of April and May due to the current pandemic we are all experiencing!

Spaghetti Pie

Recipe from Annika and KitchenKantina.com

INGREDIENTS

6 oz Spaghetti
2 TBS Butter
1/2 cup Grated Parmesan Cheese
2 Eggs well beaten
1 Cup Cottage Cheese
1lb Ground Beef, (or Pork Sausage)
1/2 Cup Chopped Onion
1/4 Cup Chopped Green Pepper
1-8 oz can Tomatoes, diced
1-6 oz oz can Tomato Paste
1/4 to 1/2 tsp Salt
1/4 tsp Pepper
1 tsp oregano
1/2 tsp Garlic Powder
1/2 cup Shredded Mozzarella



Directions

1. Cook spaghetti, drain, and rinse.
2. Stir butter into the hot spaghetti. Stir in Parmesan cheese and eggs.
3. Form Spaghetti into a "crust" in a buttered 10" pie plate, (or into any oven-able pan that you would normally use.)
4. In a skillet cook the ground beef (or pork sausage), onion and green pepper until the veggies are tender, and the meat is browned.
5. Stir in tomatoes, tomato paste, oregano, salt, pepper, and garlic powder. Heat through.
6. Turn meat into the spaghetti crust.
7. Bake uncovered (at 350F) for 20 minutes.
8. Sprinkle the Mozzarella (or any other cheese, Cheddar, Swiss ect..) until melted.
