



2019 Scout Jamboree

The 2019 Scout Jamboree on the Air is upon us and WN7BSA, the Southeast Arizona Boy Scouts Wireless Association, will be "on-the-air" for the event. The Jamboree on the Air, JOTA for short, is an international Scouting activity held annually the third full weekend in October. This year the weekend of October 18th - 20th. The JOTA event is now considered the largest event scheduled by the World Organization of Scouting.

Many EAARS members have heard WN7BSA on the air before and usually you will hear some young voice asking questions about amateur radio and this year will be no exception. In addition to our on-the-air activities members of WN7BSA and other volunteers will be staging other hands-on events.

Another event will be "Fun With Audio" or "How To Annoy Your Parents and Drive Your Friends Crazy." Participants will get to play with an audio generator, a speaker, and an oscilloscope and see the difference between a sine wave, a square wave, and a triangular wave and then blast the neighborhood with the most jaw-jarring sounds they could devise.

Morse code anyone? The youngsters will experience what it was like to send a "Morse code message" during the pioneer days.

Old Time Radio. See vacuum tubes in action as members show off some of their heirloom audio and radio equipment. Participants may even get to take home a few vacuum tubes to show off to their grandparents. Again this year, the Ray Conniff Singers and Orchestra will be attending via transcription.

And don't forget the transmitter hunt, the "hands-on" soldering demonstration, and a new event. Scouts will be able to un-solder and disassemble some heirloom electronic pieces.

But wait, there's more. After dark, members of the Tucson Amateur Astronomical Association (TAAA) will be showing off some of the wonders of the evening sky through their telescopes. We will get to see Saturn, Uranus, Neptune, and many deep sky objects.

EAARS members, please help us out! When you hear us on the air, please do not be afraid to get on and answer some of the youngsters questions. Also be prepared to ask questions.

Questions we'll be asking:

- 1. What is your QTH and how are you reading my signal?
- Can you tell me how long you have been a ham radio operator and what do you like best about amateur radio?
- 3. Was it hard to get a license?
- 4. Do you have other hobbies besides amateur radio?
- 5. Did you grew up in Tucson?
- 6. What did you do for fun when you were a teenager?
- 7. Did you ever get into trouble when you were in school?

Suggested questions you can ask:

- 1. Do you like sports?
- 2. What are your favorite teams?
- 3. Do you play a musical instrument?
- 4. Have you seen any movies recently?
- 5. Have you read any good books recently?

2019 Special Event – Ghost Town Paradise

The Cochise Amateur Radio Association has been making an annual trek to the Ghost Town of Paradise in the eastern foothills of the Chiricahua Mountains over Labor Day Weekend for is used primarily as a training event for members of the ARES/RACES unit to practice a wide variety of operator skills as well as conduct an amateur radio "special event" by operating from the Ghost Town of Paradise. This was our 41st anniversary of this event.

After an uneventful convoy to the training site adjacent to the Paradise Cemetery (31° 55.933'N, -109°12.544'W). We set up two primary HF antennas (a military surplus Inverted V [HT-20B] and a home-brew 2 element Yagi). Two individuals (AA7JB, N7NYG)) also put up personal antennas and stations for testing. This combination was effective and a total of 259 radio contacts (252 voice, 7 Digital) were made throughout the US (40 States), and three countries Wake Island, Chile, Canada). During the Sunday morning AZ State Net, 10 of the 15 AZ counties were represented. To further demonstrate capability and flexibility, we checked into the HF Arizona Traffic and Emergency Net. There was a total of approximately 32 hours of on-air operation. Two of the team members are MARS members and checked into the Sunday morning Region 9 MARS training net as well.

We noticed that the overall band conditions/ propagation were not favorable for 20 meters this weekend. Like last year, there was also some unusual sunspot activity going on. We heard several on-air mentions about this by some other hams on lower bands. This is not something we can plan for or control. While band conditions were not great, we did not experience the amount of rain and lightning we were faced with last year.

Continued deployments such as this offer great training opportunities for new members of the ARES/RACES unit as well as refresher for some of the longer-term members. It also provides opportunities to fine-tune operating procedures.

On Saturday night, the crew enjoyed grilled steaks provided by our County Emergency Services Director Gabe Lavine and cooked to perfection. Additional side dishes of traditional potato salad, tossed salad, macaroni salad, Key Lime tarts, and caramel sea salt tarts were also provided.

Paradise Special Event Station Intro

Each year for the past 40 years, the members of the Cochise Amateur Radio Association have operated a Special Event Radio Station in or near the Ghost Town of Paradise on the Labor Day Weekend. At first it was simply for fun, but for the past several years we have made it a fun event with some training in emergency operations thrown in for good measure. In past years we have operated the old forest service deuce and half van, you can see the shelter over on the north west corner of Larson Hall. When that was turned in, we did one year using a trailer and tent, what a wet year that was. Then we got the ERV which operated for several years. In 2006 we had the baptism of the MCU. I mean that literally because it was also a wet year.

The Ghost Town of Paradise is approximately 5 miles from the New Mexico/Arizona state line, east of Rodeo and just northwest of Portal AZ in the foothills of the Chiricahua Mountains. The elevation on the meadow where we set up is approximately 5500 ft above sea level. The meadow abuts the Paradise Cemetery. We have Silver Peak to our southwest at 7900 ft and Chiricahua Peak at 9700 ft to our west.

Paradise was an active silver mining town in the late 1890's and early 1900's. The Post office opened on October 23, 1901 and closed on September 30, 1943. Paradise once had 13 saloons and that speaks for itself. The original jail was an open jail where the inmate was chained around the tree or on the chain between two trees. The mines closed in 1907 but there is still a small population living in town.

Overall Operating Plan:

Some folks may go out early on Friday but the main body and the MCU will depart Green Acres at approximately 0730 on Saturday, August 30th. We normally drive out through Bisbee to Douglas, short pit stop for fuel, ice etc, and proceed east on highway 80 to Rodeo New Mexico. Just North of Rodeo is the road back west to Portal. From Portal we will take Forest Road 42B toward Paradise and stop at the Cemetery. It is on your left as you approach Paradise and quite visible from the road. Start to turn into the cemetery and then veer to your right as you go up the slight incline to the meadow. Grid Coordinates are: 31 deg 55.90N/109 deg 12.55W.

We usually operate a very flexible schedule so that we can work in some training on the MCU as well as have fun making contacts with anyone wanting a certificate from the Ghost Town of Paradise. (Show Attached). We try to be set up and operational by Noon on Saturday. The frequencies are found on in the Special Event section on the ARRL website. We were too late to get published in the September issue of QST, Special Event Section. We typically observe quiet hours at night from approximately 22:00 – 07:00 to allow beauty sleep for any that need it and to avoid bothering the local residents in the cemetery. So far they have not complained.

Any Questions? I'll stay around after the meeting to discuss any issues you may have. Come on down it is a lot of good clean family fun.



How many of you know what TOT stands for? It's found in most 2 meter and 440 and other radios both HT's and mobiles. If you are not familiar with TOT, get ready, as you are about to know what TOT stands for. TOT stands for Time Out Timer and should be one of the FIRST things that you program in your radio.

Last week or maybe the week before, EAARS experienced yet another stuck microphone with a very nice television show playing in the background. This went on for over an hour which prompted me to write another newsletter article about the TOT. There is no shame in having an open mic as it's happened to most of us, including myself with my cat lying on my desk microphone for well over 3 minutes. Knowing my kitty, probably 3 hours. Luckily, I had my TOT set and my transmitter timed out after 3 minutes of key down. If I had not had my TOT set, my kitty could have had the key depressed for a very long time and you could have listened to over an hour of a cat purring which personally, puts me to sleep.

In all seriousness, most modern and many older FM mobiles & HT's, have a TOT setting in their menu. It's extremely important you set this value to 3 minutes for three main reasons which are...

- •Save yourself from embarrassment. Stuck mics have great ears. They like to pick up words and other sounds and discussions that you probably don't want to be transmitting. I have heard it all including some great country music and I once heard someone read a credit card number out loud not knowing this was being transmitted. (I'm not kidding).
- •Save Your Radio... Nothing burns out a final in a transmitter quicker than one being stuck on for hours. Most mobiles & HT's have very poor duty cycles when it comes to the transmitter being on. The finals can heat up very quickly and even the radio's heat sink can be extremely hot to touch as the heat sink is trying its best to do its job. Don't burn out your radio when the TOT can shut off your transmitter after 3 minutes and won't key up again until the PTT is released and keyed again.
- •Stuck mics can tie up a repeater for a long time. Yes, most repeaters themselves have a TOT programmed in them. However, when the repeater times out, it will usually reset in a minute or so and start transmitting the stuck mic again. Keep in mind, when there's a stuck mic on the repeater, EMERGENCY TRAFFIC MAY NOT BE ABLE TO GET THRU.

Stuck microphones are pretty much preventable just by setting your Time Out Timer and hanging them up when not in use. It's one of the first things I do when I buy a new radio. If the new radio doesn't have a TOT, I don't buy it. Even our trusty Baofengs have a TOT setting in their menu. Also, put the microphone in its clip when not in use. Don't just throw it down onto the seat. Seats were not designed to be a mic holder. It's just gonna get stuck open when something else is thrown on top of it.

Remember you are responsible for what's being transmitted out of YOUR radio. Take preventable measures to help prevent the stuck open microphone.

Cooking up Some MagiC



One Pan Autumn Chicken Dinner

Ingredients

Bone-in, skin-on chicken thighs
Olive oil
Fresh herbs – rosemary, thyme, sage
Red wine vinegar
Garlic
Brussels sprouts
Sweet potato
Fuji apples (or other sweet baking apples)
Bacon
Salt and pepper

Preheat oven to 450 degrees.

Place pour in 2 Tbsp olive oil, red wine vinegar, herbs and garlic into a gallon size resealable bag. Add chicken and season with salt and pepper then rub mixture over chicken.

Let rest while you prep remaining ingredients.

Add sweet potatoes, apples, Brussels sprouts, and shallots to a rimmed 18 by 13-inch baking sheet. Drizzle with 2 Tbsp olive oil, season with salt and pepper then toss to coat.

Spread into an even layer.

Top with chicken pieces and sprinkle bacon over veggie/apple mixture.

Roast in preheated oven until chicken has cooked through and veggies are tender, about 30 – 35 minutes, broil during last few minutes for more browned crispy chicken skin. Serve warm.
